John Rutenberg's Continental Mark VI Sedan

John Rutenberg of Los Angeles brought a deep red 1980 Continental Mark VI Signature Series Sedan to the Western Region 2007 Fall Meet in Bakersfield. He bought the car a few years ago from Chuck Goode of San Diego. This is a high point car with 32,000 miles. It was previously shown at the Western Region 2007 summer picnic in Yorba Linda Regional Park. It has nearly every option offered on the Mark VI that year including leather seats. Most of the seats were velour. This car in 1980 listed for \$26,000 which equates to about \$140,000 today. Basically it was the S-600 Mercedes of its day. In 1980 and 1981 Lincoln only built about 2,000 of these Signature Series cars in the two door and four door combined.

Some of the special standard equipment on the Signature Series was the gold option, painted wheels to match the body, deck lid to match the roof, special carpet, bumper stripes to match the body, license plate frames to match the body, turn signal lamps

get a sunroof. Very few Mark VIs were sunroof quipped.

John also has a 1980 Lincoln Versailles in two-tone turquoise with leather bucket seats and only 7,900 miles. The Versailles was originally owned by a woman whose husband worked for Ford. She only drove the car to church and to have her hair done. John bought the Versailles from the executor of the estate.

John is an expert on the much misunderstood and much maligned Variable Venturi carburetor which was standard on both the Versailles and Mark VI. He rebuilt the Variable-Venturi carburetor on the editor's 1978 Lincoln Versailles which nobody else was able to do. A lot of Versailles owners will toss out the Variable Venturi and replace it with a two or four barrel aftermarket carburetor and sacrifice the incredible smooth operation of the Variable Venturi.

In rebuilding, the Variable Venturi you must start with a carburetor which has never had its adjustments tampered with. They are set up at the factory forever. You have to replace all of the sensors plus rebuild the carburetor because everything must work and work together in order for the system to function properly. If you don't

replace about five parts and rebuild the carburetor to exact factory specifications you will never be able to get the car to run properly or pass a smog test in California. John says it only takes ng must work ler for the sysy. If you don't

one bad sensor to keep the whole system from running right. And once the carburetor is back together it is very difficult to trace down the problem if everything is not replaced. Moreover, a lot of these parts can only be tested with Ford Rotunda specific machines. Finally, in rebuilding the carburetor you must hook up the vacuum lines as

Very recently the Versailles has become somewhat of a cult car and LCOC members are picking up very original low mileage ones which are not easy to find after some 30 years. But they do not always run right and they may not even run at all because of carburetor problems. Furthermore,
