Pace Car Yellow Forties Lincoln Continentals

The only Lincoln Continental Cabriolet entered at the Western Region Fall Meet in Bakersfield, California, in October, 2007 was a Pace Car Yellow 1947 model entered by Allan Jones and Nelson Brooks who drove all the way down from Byron, California, a distance of 231 miles. Byron is near Stockton, a straight shot on Interstate 5 but still a long ride in a 60-year-old car. Allan drives the car everwhere; he has never carried it on a trailer. This car has the regular Ford overdrive, not the Columbia but it still should get around 18 mpg on the road at a steady 60 mph.

As far as they know the car was originally sold to someone in Santa Barbara, California. Allan bought the car out of Washington State but it still had California registration. The paint, upholstery, and chrome was already redone when Allan bought it but he had to rebuild the engine and he is still doing other mechanical work.

There is a lot of misinformation out

there about Pace Car Yellow Lincoln Continental Cabriolets. The original one was the first post World War II Lincoln Continental built. It was actually a prototype and it paced the 1946 Indianapolis 500 on May 30, 1946 with Henry Ford II at the wheel and Wilbur Shaw by his side.

The color was a pale yellow, actually more cream than yellow, never offered on standard Lincoln Continentals in 1946 but offered in 1947 and 1948. There are quite a number of Pace Car Yellow Lincoln Continental Cabriolets of the era around today and a few Coupes. But the shades vary all over the spectrum of yellow from bright Canary Yellow to a medium pale yellow and very few are the original pale yellow. but LCOC

Western National Meet, Irvine, California, October 8-12



does not deduct points for any shade of yellow on these cars. If it has been repainted yellow then it must be Pace Car Yellow. It would be interesting to know if any 1947-48 Lincoln convertibles, sedans, or coupes have been repainted Pace Car Yellow.

The original 1946 Pace Car had a contrasting maroon dash with special white or ivory colored knobs and steering wheel. The seats were red leather and tan whipcord. It is doubtful that the original Pace Car Yellow Lincoln Continenal survives and it is uncertain how many more were sold in that color in 1947 and 1948.

A 1946 Ford Motor Company press release for the car and event read in part:

"Henry Ford II, grandson of the founder of the Ford Motor Company, will be carrying on an established family tradition when he slips behind the wheel of a 1946 Lincoln Continental Cabriolet to set the pace the Memorial Day race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway May 30.

Both his famous grandfather, Henry Ford, and the late Edsel Ford, father of the 28-year-old President of the Ford Company, have served as officials of previous races. Edsel Ford led the roaring pack across the starting line as the official pacemaker in 1932. And Henry Ford served as referee of the 1924 race.

Riding beside Henry Ford II this

vear in the sleek, lowslung, pacemaking Continental, will be Wilbur Shaw, speedway president. Traveling at 100-miles-anhour, the car will set the pace for the first renewal of the

500-mile race classic since the war.

Old timers, familiar with the fact that the Ford name has been associted with the speedway since 1911, when the first 500-mile race was held, are looking for history to repeat itself this year. They point out that when Henry Ford acted as referee in the 1924 race, L.L. Corun and Joe Boyer, riding the winning car, set a new record of 98.24 mph. In 1932, when Edsel Ford served as referee as well as pacemaker, Fred Fram averaged 104.144 mph to set a new record.

The pace-making appearance (of the new Lincoln Continental) at the Memorial Day race will be one of the first public showings of this new model. On the Saturday following the Memorial Day race, this pace-making Cabriolet will be in the historic Automotive Golden Jubilee parade in Detroit, which will mark the 50th Anniversary of the operation of the first Ford car by Henry Ford driven on the streets of Detroit."




