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

# Western Region Northern California Picnic

On Saturday, August 20, Western Region members and guests met at the Simi Winery in Healdsburg, California for the fourth annual LCOC Wine Country Picnic. Mike Cunningham, with dog Shelby, arrived in his 1969 Lincoln-Mercury Cougar XR-7 convertible. Jeremy Sanford and John Woodward drove over from Sacramento in their 1969 Mark III. Chris Hunter hopped over the hill from Napa in his sleek black 1972 Mark IV. Director Marv Wendt and the lovely Jan McNiel took the longest distance award, traveling all the way from Ridgecrest in their true blue 1986 Mark VII. Kent Noves and Tom Burke arrived from San Francisco in a blue sedan from some "other" automaker. All the club cars proudly flew their new LCOC flags and attracted much attention from the passers by. Guests Emily and Steve Klein and their nine-monthold son Adam were guests of honor. (Emily was the group's hostess and tour guide at the 2010 Picnic at Blackstone Winery and helped arrange this year's event.)

Simi tour guide Tim, a long-time employee of the winery, led the group on a tour of the historic winery founded in 1876. Tim told the story of Isabelle Simi Haigh, who took over operation of the winery at the age of 18 after her father's death. Isabelle and her husband kept the winery running even through Prohibition. They survived by producing communion wine, but quietly put the remainder of their production into storage, hoping the nation would eventually come to its senses and repeal the 18th Amendment.

After a tour of the modern crush facility and the wonderful historic barrel rooms, the group was treated to a tasting of five Simi wines. Members had the opportunity to purchase wine at a special price and several bottles were opened for the picnic lunch. Outside, in a beautiful picnic area under towering redwood trees planted by Isabelle in 1933 to celebrate the repeal of Prohibition, the group enjoyed a delicious lunch. Mike Cunningham had prepared a great spread, including tri-tip, roast chicken, potato salad, and vegetables. Everyone who attended agreed this was a another successful LCOC event.
