## Western Region Member Owns one of the Earliest Lincoln Continentals

Terry Knoepp, Ramona, California owns 1940 Lincoln Continental Cabriolet o6H56-17 with Serial No. H-92533 that was assembled on December 26, 1939 and shipped to Norfolk, Virginia (one of only three 1940 Lincoln Continentals shipped to that wholesale point on January 3, 1940 recorded on the Assembly Plant record card). The name of the customer who ordered this car is not recorded although "Mr." is written at the upper left as if the man's name was intended to follow, as is the case on other 1940 Lincoln Continental record cards. As built, the car was black with a red leather interior and a tan top, had blackwall tires with chrome wheel bands, a hot air heater and oil bath air cleaner, but no other accessories.

No records have been found of the car's first 14 years, but the January, 1954 Lincoln Continental Owners Club membership list includes Joseph A. Connors, Jr., of 33 Paulus Boulevard,

Raritan Gardens, New Brunswick, New Jersey. The car is listed as a 1940 Convertible which carries the same number 06H56-17.

This must have been the car with which Joseph Connors participated in the 1954 LCOC Dearborn Rallye in October, 1954 and won First Place among 1940 Lincoln Continental

Cabriolets and was pictured with several others on the cover of the Special Dearborn Rallye Edition of Continental Comments. The car has Rallye Plate #48 on the front

bumper but the New Jersey license plate is not visible. On the sixth page of this special issue another picture appears of Connors accepting the First Place ribbon from William Clay Ford with the car in the foreground and in this picture it has both the #48 Rallye Plate and New Jersey license plate visible.

Connors still owned the car 12 years later. A letter from Jesse Haines dated 2/11/67 in the 1940 Lincoln Continental register book letter file says H-92533 was owned by J.A Connors, then of 31 Mountain Heights, Berkeley Heights, New Jersey. Jesse wrote; "Saw this car. Is all original, not goofed up. Strictly early production. Nothing strange."

Apparently Connors did not keep the car long after this time. A draft of an ad offering the car for sale in *Continental Comments* is on file with a date of May, 1967 showing Herb Wetson, 190 Meadow View Avenue, Hewlett Bay Park, New York as the next owner.

Two years later the car made its first trip to California, being sold to Leigh H. Bernstein, 2985 Mission Village Drive, San Diego.

By this time it was restored and painted Beetle Green with a Tan leather interior. At The LCOC 1969 Western National Meet In San Diego in September Bernstein won a Ford Trophy and Best V-12 with the car. The car is featured on the back cover of Continental Comments #98, Fall, 1969, with Leigh and Bunny Bernstein and the trophies the car had won. There are two other pictures of the car on Page 29 of the same issue. engine compartment of the car was featured on the front cover of Continental Comments #106, Fall, 1971.

The car was sold to Gerald Wright of San Diego around 1975. Wright was a longtime member of CCCA and President of the San Diego Region of AACA. He entered the car in the LCOC Western National Meet in Coronado, California in June, 1975 and won a Ford Trophy for Best Primary Pre-War Lincoln Continental. The car is featured on the back cover of Continental Comments #122, Fall, 1975. It is again featured on Page 9 of Continental Comments 123 and the engine is pictured on Page 10 and the car is pictured with other cars on Page 11. Apparently Wright kept the car until early 1983. He lived to be nearly 100 years old.

The May, 1983 LCOC Membership Roster shows that the car was now back in Racine, Wisconsin with the owner as Bill Thompson who was a new member. By the end of 1987 Thompson had sold the car to Steve Kalcich of Menomonee Falls, Wisconsin.

In December, 1998 Ken Tibbet of Jamul, east of San Diego, bought the car and shipped it back to the West Coast for a second time. By this time the car had been restored.

In the early 2000s it was sold to Terry Knoepp of Ramona, California who had it again restored over a two or three year period by a restoration shop in Escondido, California. The car is now Beetle Green again with a Tan

leather interior and a Tan top.

This is car No. 17. Edsel Ford had car No. 20 and Frank Lloyd Wright had either No. 16 or 18. Jackie Cooper had No. 3 which was the first retail car. The first two were show cars. All of these cars were cabriolets, no coupes were built until the spring of 1940.

Terry Knoepp drives the car locally and has entered it in several San Diego area shows but he has never entered it in LCOC national competition.

Terry is a lifetime resident of the San Diego area. His father was a San Diego physician.

Terry lives in a beautiful home in Ramona built on a large lot. Some of the cars are in a large garage attached to his house and others are in a large garage at the rear of the property Some of his other cars are: A restored 1941 Buick Roadmaster convertible sedan which he serviced as a kid when he worked at a gas station in LaJolla in the fifties, a 1947 low mileage Custom Packard Clipper, a 1955 Cadillac eight-passenger sedan, a low mileage 1953 Imperial Newport which was a special order rumored for Jane Mansfield, a low mileage 1949 Chrysler New Yorker club coupe, a restored 1937 LaSalle coupe, a restored 1950 Ford convertible in Sportsman's Green, and a 1951 Buick Roadmaster with low mileage but fully restored.

## A Short History of the Sportsmen's Lodge

The next Board Meeting will be at the Sportsmen's Lodge, February 11, site of the 2011 Kick-Off Banquet. The Sportsmen's Lodge is a hotel located on Ventura Boulevard in Studio City, Los Angeles, California. Operating under various names (including "Hollywood Trout Farms") since the 1880s, the Sportsmen's Lodge is a San Fernando Valley landmark and remains a popular spot for celebrations, dinners and public events. Located in the heart of the Valley's studio district, the Sportsmen's Lodge was a popular gathering spot for cast and crew in old Hollywood, including Clark Gable, Bette Davis, John Wayne, Humphrey Bogart, Lauren Bacall, Spencer Tracy and Katharine Hepburn.

The original Sportsmen's Lodge opened in the 1880s before the movie business existed and before Studio City had its name. A history of Studio City published by the Studio City Sun describes the Lodge as an "enduring symbol of lost rural Valley life." The Sun noted that the site has had many owners since the 1880s but was "always a geographic crossroads for

travelers because of its proximity to the river, the canyons, and watering holes created by a natural artesian spring." In the days before freeways were built across the Valley, "all traffic passed along Ventura's two dirt lanes in the sparsely populated Valley, and when people were starting to take road trips, this was an oasis at the end of the road." In the first half of the 20th Century, the Sportsmen's Lodge was known for its trout-fishing lake where families came to catch and eat their own dinners, cooked courtesy of the lodge's restaurant. In the 1910s, the Lodge was called "Hollywood Trout Farms" and was described as "a ramshackle collection of huts." The ponds were augmented with man-made lakes in the 1920s, and fish were grown and delivered as far as Las Vegas and San Luis Obispo. From the late 1930s until the end of World War II, it was known as "Trout Lakes".

The Sportsmen's Lodge became the place to hang out for cast and crew members working at the nearby Republic Studios. The heart of Republic Studios was its B-westerns, and many western-film leads, including John Wayne, Gene Autry, Rex Allen, and Roy Rogers, became stars at Republic. Movie posters signed by Hollywood cowboys who stayed there still hang on the walls of the Lodge's coffee shop. Some of Hollywood's remaining silver screen cowboys still gather at the Sportsmen's Lodge for the annual Golden Boot and Silver Spur Awards.

In 1945, the property was renamed the Sportsmen's Lodge, and a formal restaurant and cocktail lounge were added. Guests were given rods and bait to catch their fish and make dinner.



According to one account, the Lodge's trout ponds "drew luminaries such as Tallulah Bankhead, Lena Horne, Bette Davis, and Joan Blondell, who baited hooks with liverwurst and drank martinis as waiters served dinner on white tablecloths. When celebrities such as Clark Gable frequented the Lodge, rates were \$9 for a single room and \$25 for a suite.

A small pier adjacent to the restaurant catered to celebrities who worked in nearby studios. The pier was said to be Clark Gable's favorite fishing spot, and Humphrey Bogart and Lauren Bacall were regulars.

As the San Fernando Valley grew in the years after World War II, the urban sprawl sprung up around the Sportsmen's Lodge and its trout fishing lakes. In 1962, the modern Sportsmen's Lodge Hotel was built adjacent to the original lodge. When the hotel was built, the lakes became home to a family of swans and some of the Valley's first fine dining establish-

ments, frequented by legendary Hollywood stars.

According to the Studio City Sun, the Los Angeles Health Department ended the era of fishing at the Lodge when the 1971 San Fernando earthquake diverted the natural spring.
