Fabulous Fords Forever, April 22

Sunday, April 22 was the 27th year of the Fabulous Fords Forever at Knott's Berry Farm in Buena Park, California. This is the largest all Ford show in California featuring Ford, Lincoln and Mercury cars. The show featured Ford products from 1903-2012 in 52 classes. There was a Lincoln class for Lincolns and Continentals of all years from 1922 to the present. There were about 37 Lincolns from the '30s to the 2000s. Many of these Lincolns were altered or customized.

The day was overcast and cool, perfect for this special day. (It's usually unbearably hot on the asphalt.) Nearly 1,900 Ford built cars assembled in the parking lot at Knott's. Over 1,000 were Mustangs, leaving about 900 to represent all the other Ford makes from Model Ts to the exotic Pantera, Tiger, Saleen, and Cobras. This year the show celebrated the 80th anniversary of the '32 Ford, 50th anniversary of the Cobra, and 45th anniversary of the Mercury Cougar.

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
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Director's message



Huntington Beach Concours Sunday, June 3

Over its 24 year history, the Huntington Beach Concours has grown to be one of the outstanding automotive events in Southern California. First staged in 1986, the Concours has its home on the picturesque lawns of Huntington Beach Central Park in Huntington Beach. Central Park lies adjacent to the Huntington Beach Public Library & Cultural Resource Center at Talbert and Goldenwest. The field of entrants includes the best domestic, British, European and Asian, vintage to current automobiles and motorcycles. Recently, vintage and racing bicycles have also been added to the event.

When the event was staged in 1986, its premise was not the usual Concours that favors the elite makes of the automotive world. The Steering Committee envisioned an event that would feature all automotive makes. The Committee understood that all car guvs have lavished time, effort and expense on their automobile or motorcycle of choice, and all entries are deserving of recognition. Moreover, whether a car guy, motorcyclist or cyclist; everyone has an appreciation for the broad spectrum of entries at the event. The Committee felt that a Ferrari owner would enjoy seeing the Fords and Street Rods. Likewise, a Muscle Car man would equally enjoy Mercedes or Masarati. Over the years, the Committee's vision has been proven out time and time again, as many of the entrants on a regular basis own a variety of foreign and domestic makes, and enter them each year. Comments from the entrants also validate the Event as they very much enjoy seeing the wide variety of manufacturers and builders represented.

The Huntington Beach Concours has been a constant fund raiser for the Children's Resource Center at the Huntington Beach Public Library.

The total funds raised have been well over \$300,000 over the life of the Concours. Funds raised go directly to support the Children's Resource Center wing at the library.

This year, for the first time, there will be a Lincoln class, with five sub-classes to be determined by entries. We will all be

parking our Lincolns and Continentals together, and with space permitting, be alongside the Thunderbirds.

In addition to the car show, there will be a student auto art contest, entertainment, Hot Wheels races for the kids, food and other vendors, and a VIP luncheon for \$25 paid in advance.

You will not find a better value in a Concours of this caliber. Entry is only \$30, which includes admission for you, your car and a guest. Additional guests are \$10 each. All cars are welcome as there will be judging in a drivers class as well as concours class. If you prefer not to have your car judged, that is also an option.

Saturday June 2nd is the Rod and Custom portion of the event. Sunday June 3rd is the vintage car concours. Our club is having an informal competition with the Thunderbird and Packard clubs to see which club can field the most cars. We're hoping to see a big turnout.



Orange County Empire Railway Museum, April 29

Our second April event was a day at the the most famous railway museum in California. There were trains and trolleys, picnickers, and vintage car folks. They let us display our Lincolns, among other makes, against a background of bells and whistles, steam and smoke. It was all put on by Great Autos of Yesterday on a Sunday of perfect spring weather in Southern California. The place was Perris, California and our Western Region host was Jim Ayres.

We explored the West's largest collection of railway locomotives, passenger and freight cars, streetcars, old time interurban electric cars, buildings and other artifacts dating from the 1870s. Founded in 1956, there is nothing like this railway museum in the U.S. We had plenty of good fellowship and good food, and lots of opportunities to photograph our cars in a pure railroad setting. turnout of Western Region members and cars was not as large as Fabulous Fords a week earlier but it sure was fun.








