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
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Director's message

Cadillacs, Model Ts, T Birds, Packards, Mercedes, Bentleys, Porsches, Jaguars, Mini Coopers, Panteras, Lamborghinis, Ferraris, Lexus and other odd cars.

Our Lincolns were assembled in one line on grass and under trees at the perimeter of the field, facing a line of T Birds and the scenic lake.

The weather was a pleasingly overcast, with the sun peaking through nicely in the afternoon.

There was an informal competition with the Thunderbird Club as to who could field more cars; the T Bird people won with 17 cars. They picked their favorite of our cars: Bruce &

Helen Hutchinson's beautiful light blue '56 Continental Mark II; and we chose our favorite T Bird: Jim Kilsanin's '60 T Bird. A round of applause went up as he put the convertible top down (that engineering was further refined for the Lincoln Continentals starting in 1961).

The earliest Lincolns were two first year black 1940 Lincoln Zephyr Continentals: Elliott Jones' Cabriolet, #24 of 350, and my Coupe, #44 of 54. (We meet again; I took a picture of our cars together for the cover of Lincoln and Continental Comments issue #296 - September / October 2010 commemorating the 70th birthday of the Continental.)

Marv Wendt, LCOC Western Region Director, brought his Cadillac powered '47 Lincoln Continental Coupe.

There were two Continental Mark IIs: Bruce and Helen Hutchinson's award winning '56 and Bob Barger's '57.

Three beautiful early '60s Lincoln Continentals were next: Chuck Goode's '61 Columbia blue Convertible, and Jim Ayres' '61 Hardtop and '64 Turquoise Convertible.


There were three '70s Lincolns: George Richards' '71 Mark III, Kyler Jafari's '79 Mark V *Collector Series*, and a totally customized '77 Mark V owned by Steve Braddon.
