# Fourth Annual Lincoln Homecoming at Hickory Corners, Michigan August 7-13 "100 Anniversary of Lincoln"

The big Lincoln Homecoming in Michigan is just about upon us. The host hotels are now booked but there are additional hotels in the Kalamazoo, Michigan area. Additional information is available on our Lincoln Motor Car Museum website: www.lincolncarmuseum.org/2017 homecoming.

Because this Meet is a combination Lincoln Homecoming, 100 year Anniversary of the founding of the Lincoln Motor Company, and the ONE AND ONLY LCOC Meet for 2017 we are anticipating more than 150 Lincoln cars on the field and over 300 attendees from our Lincoln clubs, which could be the biggest Lincoln show ever. We had a limited number of hotel rooms and tour sizes are limited so it will be first come, first served until rooms and tours are filled.

This ONE 2017 LCOC Grand National meet at Hickory Corners, Michigan will

replace our traditional annual three national meets--the LCOC Eastern National Meet, the LCOC Mid-America National Meet, and the LCOC Western National Meet. This judged meet will be part of the fourth annual Lincoln Homecoming, which will recognize the 100 year Anniversary of the founding of the Lincoln

Motor Company, created in 1917 to build Liberty V12 airplane engines for the Allied Forces during World War I. (The company was reincorporated in 1920 to build motorcars.) *The*

The 2017 Homecoming is being hosted by the Lincoln Owners Club, but all four Lincoln clubs are sponsoring this annual Lincoln Homecoming: Lincoln-Zephyr Owners Club, Road Race Lincoln Register, Lincoln and Continental Owners Club and the LOC. It will feature Judging and Display/Exhibition only classes for this great Lincoln car show.

We want to make this a memorable event with an option to spend three days, starting Monday, August 7 thru Wednesday, August 9, at the birthplace of Ford Motor Company, Dearborn, Michigan. The host hotel is the historic Dearborn Inn, which is adjacent to The Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village, which you can visit at your convenience.

The historic Dearborn Inn was built in 1929 by Henry Ford as an airport hotel for his nearby airfield. Monday night will feature a welcoming buffet at the hotel. On Tuesday you can visit the Henry Ford Museum and Greenfield Village. Tuesday night we'll venture to the Dearborn Country Club to enjoy another buffet. On Wednesday morning you may park your Lincoln at Ford World Headquarters for a photo opportunity in front of the iconic building and enjoy shopping in the Ford employee store and lunch in the company cafeteria before departing for Hickory Corners.

# Western Region Member's 1966 Lincoln Continental Convertible to be Featured on Jay Leno's Garage TV show August 9 by Glenn Gordon

When LCOC Western Region Director Jim Ayres contacted me to ask if I would be interested in a video production with my 1966 Lincoln Continental convertible, little did I know that it was the beginning of something every car collector would love to happen to them.

Did you ever wonder? Does anyone beside myself really appreciate all the blood, sweat, tears, sleepless nights and thousands upon thousands of dollars we put into our classics? Will anyone, beside my fanatical self, really notice my car? Well, the answer is yes. Someone eventually will, if they haven't already and that someone for me was Jay Leno.

That call I received from Jim Ayres was regarding a series production shoot at the Smokehouse Restaurant in Burbank, California. A very well know historical eatery popular with Hollywood's elite from the 1940's through the 1970's and still very popular with Warner Studio employees today. It called for a scene for *Jay Leno's Garage* series on CNBC, with Jay Leno driving up to the restaurant in a 1960's Lincoln Continental Convertible.

Jim Ayres wasn't provided any further information than this from Jay Leno's car manager. (With 180 cars in his collection, I think you really need someone to manage them.) After I confirmed with Jim I would agree to do the production he sent my contact information to Jay's car manager. A day later he contacted me and informed me it would be an entire day's production, about 8 hours. Starting off at the Smokehouse Restaurant, then back to Jay Leno's private garage for a driving scene with Go-Pro cameras and then a 90 minute photo shoot under the "lightbox". He then told me my car was going to be featured and highlighted on an upcoming episode of Jay Leno's Garage, where Jay drives the car through parts of LA. I felt like I just won the lottery! On top of all this, they were willing to pay ME. (Little did they know, I was willing to pay THEM.)

The day started off at the Smokehouse Restaurant with a 30-second scene where Jay drives up to the restaurant and gives the car to the valet. This scene took about 4 shoots and about 30 minutes. Then, after a very nice Sunday Brunch that was provided to us by the Smokehouse, we then traveled about 5 miles to Jay's garage where he stores his vast car and motorcycle collection, along with tons of auto memorabilia from the 1920's through today. All very nicely displayed.

Upon returning to Jay's garage, his crew quickly descends upon my car and begins installing multiple Go-Pro cameras, all very delicately installed with rubber suction cups. (I felt these boys knew what they were doing since most of Jay's cars are worth considerably more money than my car.) After installation, Jay took the wheel and along with a camera crew in front, pulled out of the garage to tour and film the driving scenes. Oh yeah, one thing I forgot to mention. They shut the garage door and left me inside, alone with a few men setting up the photo shoot AND Jay's private car collection. (Think of the scene from Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory when the young boy Charlie walks into the chocolate factory for the first time.) That was me!

After Jay returned from the driving scene, he pulled the car into the "Lightbox" area, where your car will never look better! These lights could make Burt Reynolds look like he's 30 again. After 90 minutes of photo shooting from every which angle, the day came to an end. I never dreamed of this happening and still think it never did. Sincere thanks to Jim Ayres for thinking of me and help in making one of the most memorable experiences of my life. I will never ever forget it! The tentative day of airing is Wednesday, August 9th at 10 PM on CNBC on Jay Leno's Garage.

The second part of this meet will be 9-13 in August Hickory Corners/Kalamazoo and will feature several tours and LCOC and LZOC/LOC Judging and Exhibition/Display-Only Classes, as well as People's Choice awards, for Best of Show and Ladies Choice Best of Show Awards voted by participants on Saturday. A Lincoln Car Auction will be held at 2 p.m., and the LMCM dedications will be held at 3 p.m. Saturday night festivities will begin with a happy hour and banquet at the hotel. Our guest speaker will be Jack Telnack, former Global Vice President of Design, Ford Motor Company. LOC and LZOC will present their awards; and at 9 p.m. we will have the raffle drawing for the winner of the 2017 Lincoln Continental.
